We will spend many moments with God, and we know that our sins are forgiven and that we are on our way to heaven.

Thankfulness Through It All

Taking this "servant" attitude of thankfulness in all of life's circumstances will help us react as Mathew Henry did when he was mugged. He wrote in his diary, "Let me be thankful first because I was never robbed before; second, although they took my purse, they did not take my life; third, because although they took my all, it was not much; and fourth, because it was I who was robbed not I who robbed."

When things don't go our way at work, we will do well to take on the same attitude. As the world grows further and further away from God's truth, we can feel defeated. As Paul Harvey would say, "Then there is the rest of the story." Remember for Christians there is a great end to the story, we win because of Jesus. In Philippians 2:14-15, Paul illustrates how a Christian will become more visible. The darker the times, the more Christians should stand out. If our visibility is marked by being downcast and defeated, then we lose the battle. James wrote in chapter 1:2-4 (ESV) ...

"Count it all joy when you meet trials of various kinds, for you know that the testing of your faith produces steadfastness. And let steadfastness have its full effect, that you may be perfect and complete, lacking in nothing."

Comparing our ministry to others can make us either prideful or discouraged. No one's ministry is greater or lesser than the one God has for each of us. Don't miss the opportunities God has provided thinking they are too small. Can you be thankful for what God has called you to do with the gifts He has given you?


